He received his PhD from the University of Warsaw (the Institute of International Relations) in 2005. Since 2008 he has been employed by the Hong Kong Baptist University. He holds regular lectures on European Integration, Security Studies, International Relations, and Global Studies. His academic background includes a BA in Law (International Law and International Relations), an MA in Political Sciences (European Union Studies) and a PhD in Political Sciences with a specific interest in the European Union foreign, security and defense policy. His publication list contains papers, chapters and monographs emphasising the role of the European Union in international relations, the institutional architecture of its foreign policy, the EU's axiological performances and its international political power. In addition, many papers treat the EU's role in the new international context in relation to the contemporary challenges of the liberal world order and the EU's role and place in it.
